As Chief of the Glen Ridge Police Department, I am proud to present our 2024 Annual Report, highlighting our ongoing commitment to public safety, innovation, and community partnership. This year, we embraced modern law enforcement strategies, reinforced our core values, and made significant strides toward creating a safer community for all residents.

In 2024, we advanced our use of technology with expanded body-worn cameras, upgraded our digital evidence management system, and implemented data-driven policing strategies. Additionally, through a federally funded grant, we acquired four automated license plate readers, set to be deployed in 2025. These innovations improve public safety, accountability, and our ability to respond effectively to crime.

A significant milestone was our re-accreditation in October 2024 by the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police, after our initial accreditation in 2021. This re-accreditation reflects our ongoing commitment to maintaining the highest standards in law enforcement practices.

This year, we also introduced a full-time Traffic Bureau Officer, the first of its kind in our department. This position has been instrumental in reducing traffic crashes, addressing violations, and working closely with the community to enhance roadway safety.

We were also honored to receive a Gold Status award from "Safe Routes to School" in recognition of our efforts to promote safe and accessible transportation for students. This achievement highlights our commitment to ensuring the safety of our young residents.

Looking ahead, we remain focused on continuous improvement. We will invest in officer training, including deescalation, mental health crisis intervention, and cultural awareness. We also plan to enhance our use of analytics to optimize resource allocation and improve response times.

Through strategic enforcement and strong community partnerships, we've seen a decrease in property crimes and a more focused approach to violent offenses. Our collaboration with local businesses, schools, and residents continues to foster a safer, more vibrant community.

At the core of our work are the values of Integrity, Professionalism, and Repsect. We remain dedicated to fair, impartial policing and ensuring the well-being of every resident. We thank our residents, local leaders, and law enforcement partners for their unwavering support and look forward to continuing our shared commitment to safety, trust, and progress.

## TRAFFIC DATA

#### **Violations and Motor Vehicle Data**


The Glen Ridge Police Department issued 3,564 traffic summonses in 2024. A total of 1,765 were issued for moving violations, 1,799 summonses were issued for parking violations and 101 borough ordinance violations were issued. There were a total of 3,422 traffic stops, 1,100 traffic details conducted and 126 vehicles towed. The department completed 7 traffic surveys and received 66 traffic related complaints which were investigated.





### **Traffic Crash Data**

In 2024, the department responded to 207 traffic crashes, 40 of which had injuries, compared to 235 traffic crashes, with 63 injurie in 2023. There were zero fatal motor vehicle accidents and 9 pedestrians were struck by a motor vehicle.



### **Traffic Officer**

Sgt. Matthew Perigo continues to be assigned as the Departments dedicated traffic enforcement officer, a position he has been assigned to since August 2023. His responsibilities include responding to traffic complaints, enforcement and conducting traffic surveys. After being assigned, Sgt. Perigo conducted 1,315 motor vehicle stops, completed 4 traffic surveys and 432 specific traffic details. The assignment continues to prove to successful and has allowed the department to respond to the multitude of traffic complaints in an expeditious manner. Additionally, the department saw a reduction in motor vehicle crashes in 2024 (207) as compared to 2023 (235). Sgt. Perigo investigated 18 specific traffic complaints and completed ten comprehensive surveys

### **Traffic Improvement**

At the recommendation of our traffic officer, the Borough made significant traffic improvements this year. New speed limit signs were installed on multiple streets as well as all school zones. A four way stop sign was introduced at Hillside Avenue and Clark Street. Optical speed bars and a parking lane were painted onto Glen Ridge Avenue, narrowing the roadway as a calming measure for traffic to reduce speeds. Crosswalks were repainted with the assistance of the Glen Ridge Public Works. Upgraded crosswalk reflective beacons were installed at Ridgewood Avenue and Baldwin as well as Ridgewood Avenue and Wildwood Terrace. Reflective Pylons were also installed at multiple locations along Ridgewood Avenue to protect pedestrians utilizing crosswalks. The Department and Borough continue to work to improve pedestrian, bicyclist and motorist safety. All suggestions are welcomed.


### **Traffic Grants**

The Glen Ridge Police Department participated in one traffic grant in 2024. The grant was issued through the NJ Department of Highway Traffic Safety and was for the Click it or Ticket Campaign. During this two week period, Officers conducted 66 hours of enforcement which resulted in 148 traffic stops, 74 traffic summonses issued and 3 arrest.

### **Racial Profiling Statistics**








## **ARREST DATA**

In 2024, The Glen Ridge Police Department made 56 arrests. Those arrested were processed at the police department and either released in accordance with New Jersey Bail Reform Laws or transported to the Essex County Correctional Facility. Additionally, 54 criminal complaints were filed with the courts.







## **PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS**

### **Internal Affairs Report and Major Discipline**

The Internal Affairs Division consists of Lt. Timothy Faranda, Lt. Dean Gnardellis, and Det. Sgt. Daniel Manley. In 2024, the unit processed three complaints of alleged misconduct and closed out two complaints from 2023. Additionally, the unit conducted two random drug tests of sworn personnel in accordance with the New Jersey Attorney General Guidelines. Early warning monitoring was conducted for all department members. There was no major discipline reported in 2024.

The Internal Affairs Division monitors and reports quarterly and annually to the Essex County Prosecutor's Office on all complaints, as well as monthly on any Brady and Giglio violations resulting from untruthfulness.

The Glen Ridge Police Department accepts and investigates all complaints of department and employee alleged misconduct or wrongdoing from any person, department employee or any other source, including anonymous sources. Complaints may also be submitted electronically at <a href="internalaffairs@glenridgenj.org">internalaffairs@glenridgenj.org</a>. Additionally, the unit completes a command level review for any Use of Force and Pursuit incidents, as well as any other incident which may require a review to determine if the officers' actions were appropriate and followed departmental procedures.

### **Motor Vehicle Pursuits**


In 2024, the Glen Ridge Police Department reported no motor vehicle pursuits. There were, however, 20 instances where a vehicle failed to stop for a Glen Ridge officer and fled the scene without a pursuit being initiated. This marked an increase from 11 such instances in 2023.


#### **Use of Force**

In 2024, there were zero use of force reports filed by Glen Ridge officers, a decrease from two reports in 2023. There were three documented show of force incidents involving the use of constructive authority with a firearm, down from four in 2023. A command-level review continues to be completed for all reported incidents.



### **ACCREDITATION**

On October 10<sup>th</sup>, 2024 the Glen Ridge Police Department successfully completed re-accreditation with the New Jersey State Associations of the Chiefs of Police. The process for accreditation began in 2017, under the direction of then Captain Sean Quinn the department was required to revise and update all of its policies and procedures. Chief Quinn worked tirelessly to implement the new policies and procedures and to meet the standards and proofs required to achieve accreditation. Throughout the re-accreditation process the department was required to meet 112 standards and produce more than 450 proofs as well as pass a rigorous onsite inspection.

To achieve and complete the re-accreditation processes means that the department has met the required standards and operating effectively and efficiently. Accreditation is required to be maintained with additional assessments to become reaccredited every three years.




Only 54% of police departments statewide achieve accreditation status, and just 32% are re-accredited, making this recognition a testament to our dedication to serving the Glen Ridge community with integrity and excellence. Special thanks to Mayor Deborah Mans, Police Commissioner Peter Hughes, Borough Administrator Michael Zichelli and the Glen Ridge Council for their constant support of the Glen Ridge Police Department as we pursue this endeavor. The department would also like to extend to special thanks to our Accreditation Manager, Lieutenant Dean Gnardellis, whose hard work and diligence were instrumental in this achievement.



### **DETECTIVE BUREAU**

In 2024, the Detective Bureau, consisting of one supervisor and one detective, conducted thorough investigations into **152 incidents**, successfully clearing **94 cases**—resulting in a **61% clearance rate**. This marks a **9% increase from 2023**, a testament to the department's continued investment in training, technology, and strategic partnerships at the local, county, state, and federal levels.



Despite the ongoing impact of bail reform legislation, which has led to a statewide decline in the issuance of arrest warrants, the Detective Bureau remained steadfast in bringing criminal offenders to justice. Notably, the percentage of cases cleared via **Court Summons** more than **doubled**, rising from **5% to 11%**, reflecting the dedication and persistence of our investigators in pursuing cases through final disposition.

Over the past three years, the department has fully committed to implementing modern crime-fighting technology, and in 2024, those efforts yielded significant results. Detectives regularly leveraged advanced investigative tools, including Communications Data Warrants, Automatic License Plate Readers (ALPRs), Drones, Vehicle Forensics, and Electronic Device Extraction Software, to analyze critical evidence, identify suspects, and build strong cases leading to criminal charges. These technologies have significantly enhanced the bureau's ability to solve complex cases more efficiently and bring offenders to justice.

A particularly notable success this year was our collaborative approach to combating motor vehicle thefts committed immediately following residential-occupied burglaries. Through close cooperation with the NJ State Police Auto Theft Taskforce, the Regional Operations & Intelligence Center (ROIC), and Newark's Real Time Crime Center, detectives were able to identify, track, and charge those responsible for these offenses more effectively than ever before. These partnerships played a critical role in ensuring that offenders were swiftly brought to justice.

As we move forward, the Detective Bureau remains committed to staying ahead of evolving crime trends through continuous training, technological advancements, and strengthening interagency collaborations to further enhance public safety in our community.



### **Project Medicine Drop**

The department's prescription drug abuse prevention program, Project Medicine Drop, continued to grow in popularity in 2024. This proactive crime prevention program provides residents an opportunity to properly discard expired, unused, or unwanted prescription medications. The department collected 175 pounds of expired, unused, or unwanted prescription medications in 2024. Since launching the program in 2017, the department has collected 1,708 pounds of medication.

### **Reassignment of Personnel**

On March 3, 2024, Detective Re was reassigned to the patrol division as an acting sergeant. Detective Re spent just over two years in the detective bureau. During that time, he successfully investigated various crimes, including, but not limited to, theft, burglary, robbery, motor vehicle theft, drug offenses, fraud, sexual assault, and criminal mischief.

### **School Engagement**

In addition to investigative responsibilities, the detective bureau served as the liaison to the Glen Ridge School District. Detectives conducted various security drills and community policing programs throughout the borough's schools. They also participated in security meetings and tabletop exercises with school administrators.

## **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

In the past year, our police department has strengthened its commitment to fostering positive relationships with the Glen Ridge and Essex County communities through a variety of outreach initiatives. Events such as *National Night Out* brought neighbors and officers together in a celebration of safety and collaboration, while programs like the *Police Trading Card Program* and the *Bicycle Rodeo* engaged our youth in fun, educational activities that emphasize trust and connection as well as introduced our youth to our officers through meaningful interactions. The *Car Seat Installation* program provided families with hands-on safety support, and events like *Walk to School with an Officer* and *Lemonade with Law Enforcement* offered informal opportunities to connect with officers in everyday settings. Seasonal highlights included the festive *Santa Parade*, which brought holiday cheer to the Borough.

Additionally, our department played a crucial role in ensuring the safety and security of participants and spectators at the Borough's four annual road races—the *Lager Run 5K*, *Sunset Classic 8K*, *Ashenfelter 8K*, and *Rhino Romp*. Officers worked diligently to manage traffic, provide emergency response support, and create a secure environment, allowing these beloved community events to run smoothly and safely. These combined efforts exemplify our department's dedication to building a safer, more connected community for all.


